

To All to whom These Presents Shall Come, Greeting:

Whereas, a Certificate of the Register of the Land Office at Vernal, Utah, has been deposited in the General Land Office, whereby it appears that full payment has been made by the claimant Fannie B. Singleton according to the provisions of the Act of Congress of April 24, 1890, entitled "An Act making further provision for the sale of the Public Lands;" and the acts supplemental thereto, for the West half of the southwest quarter of Section thirty-three in Township four south of Range ten West of the Uinta Special Meridian, Utah, containing eighty acres, according to the official Plat of the Survey of the said land, returned to the General Land Office by the Surveyor General:

Now Know ye, That the United States of America, in consideration of the premises, and in conformity with the several Acts of Congress in such case made and provided, has seen and granted and by these presents does Give and Grant unto the said claimant and to the heirs of the said claimant the tract above described; To Have and To Hold the same, together with all the rights, privileges, immunities, and appurtenances, of whatsoever nature, therunto belonging, unto the said claimant and to the heirs and assigns of the said claimant forever; subject to any vested and accrued water rights for mining, agricultural manufacturing, or other purposes, and rights to ditches and reservoirs used in connection with such water rights, as may be recognized and acknowledged by the local customs, laws, and decisions of courts; and there is reserved from the lands hereby granted, a right of way thereon for ditches and canals constructed by the authority of the United States. Also excepting and reserving to the United States all oil and gas and all shale or other rock valuable as a source of petroleum and nitrogen in the lands so patented, and to it, as persons authorized by it, the right to prospect for, mine, and remove such deposits from the same upon compliance with the conditions and subject to the provisions and limitations of the Act of July 17, 1914 (38 Stat., 509).

In Testimony Whereof, I, Woodrow Wilson, President of the United States of America, have caused these letters to be made Patent, and the Seal of the General Land Office to be hereunto affixed.

Whereas, a Certificate of the Register of the Land Office at Vernal, Utah, has been deposited in the General Land Office, whereby it appears that full payment has been made by the claimant Louis Cingersoll according to the provisions of the Act of Congress of April 24, 1820, entitled "An Act making further provision for the Sale of the Public Lands"; and the acts supplemental thereto, for the southeast quarter of the southwest quarter and the lot four of Section seven in Township Four South of Range nine West of the Uinta Special Meridian, Utah, containing seventy-nine and nineteen-hundredths acres, according to the Official Plat of the Survey of the Said Land, returned to the General Land Office by the Surveyor-General:

Now Know ye, That the United States of America, in consideration of the premises, and in conformity with the several Acts of Congress in such case made and provided, Has Given and Granted, and by these presents does Give and Grant unto the said claimant and to the heirs of the said claimant the tract above described; To Have and To Hold the same, together with all the rights, privileges, immunities, and appurtenances, of whatever nature, therunto belonging, unto the said claimant and to the heirs and assigns of the said claimant forever; subject to any vested and accrued water rights for mining, agricultural, manufacturing, or other purposes, and rights to ditches and reservoirs used in connection with such water rights, as may be recognized and acknowledged by the local customs, laws, and divisions of courts; and there is reserved from the lands hereby granted, a right of way thereon for ditches or canals constructed by the authority of the United States.

Also excepting and reserving to the United States all oil and gas and all shale and other rock valuable as a source of petroleum and nitrogen in the lands so patented, and to it,
