Now Know ye, That the United States of America in consideration of the premises and pursuant to the said Acts of Congress, have given, and granted, and by these presents do give and grant unto the said, "Union Pacific Railroad Company" and to its assigns, the tracts of land listed as aforesaid and described in the foregoing;

Yet excluding and excepting from the transfer by these presents, "All mineral lands" should any such be found to exist in the tracts described in the foregoing, but this inclusion and exception according to the terms of the Statute shall not be construed to include coal and iron land"

To Have and to Hold the said tracts with the appurtenances unto the said Union Pacific Railroad Company and to its successors and assigns forever with the exclusion and exception as aforesaid.

In Testimony Whereof, I William Mc Kinley President of the United States of America have caused these letters to be made patent and the seal of the General Land Office to be hereunto affixed
