Know all men by these Presents. That the Union Pacific Railway Company, which is a Corporation formed and existing by the consolidation of the Kansas Pacific Railway Company, the Denver Pacific Railway and Telegraph Company and the Union Pacific Railroad Company, under the corporate name and style of the Union Pacific Railway Company by authority of an Act of Congress entitled "An act to aid in the construction of a railroad and telegraph line from the Missouri River to the Pacific Ocean, and to secure to the Government the use of the same for postal, military and other purposes" approved July 1<sup>st</sup> 1862 and acts amendatory thereof, which said Company has succeeded to and become seized and possessed of all the real estate and property of the said constituent companies, whether real, personal or mixed, and among other things of all the land granted to said Union Pacific Railroad Company by the aforesaid act of Congress in aid of the construction of its road, not conveyed away by said Company at the date of such consolidation (to wit) January 1<sup>st</sup> 1880 in consideration of the sum of Eight hundred (\$800<sup>00</sup>) Dollars to it paid, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged doth hereby Grant, Bargain, sell and Convey unto John H. Robinson of the County of Morgan and in the Territory of Utah, and described as follows: To wit: The West half of the North East quarter (N.E. 1/4) and the North East quarter (N.E. 1/4) of Section No twenty five (25) in Township No five (5) North of Range One (1) East of the Salt Lake Meridian, containing according to the United States Survey thereof Two hundred and forty (240) Acres more or less, being the same premises contracted to be sold to John H. Robinson by Contract No 1510-11 dated July 8<sup>th</sup> 1885. Reserving however, to the said Union Pacific Railway Company the exclusive right to prospect for Coal and other minerals within and underlying said lands, and to mine for and remove the same if found, and for this purpose it shall have right of way over and across said lands and space

Bouned and de-  
scribed as follows to wit: Commencing at a point six rods in a  
N.E. direction from the S.E. corner of Lot No. 3, thence North 40° East Nine  
(9) Rods; thence N. 37° 30' W. 17 1/2 Rods to Pine Creek; thence up said Pine  
Creek S. 26° W. Nine (9) rods; thence S. 27° 30' E. 15 1/4 Rods to beginning  
and containing One hundred and fifty six and one-half (156 1/2) square rods.

The Union Pacific Railway Company

The United States of America

To all to whom these presents shall come, Greeting

Whereas, by the Acts of Congress approved July 1-1862 and July  
2-1864 "to aid in the construction of a railroad and telegraph line  
from the Missouri River to the Pacific Ocean and to secure to the  
Government the use of the same for postal, military and other purposes,  
authority is given to the Union Pacific Railroad Company to construct  
a railroad and telegraph line under certain conditions and stipulations  
so expressed in said acts, and provision is made for granting  
to the said Company, every alternate section of public land designated  
by odd numbers to the amount of ten alternate sections per mile
