To All to whom these Presents shall come, Greeting:

Whereas, In pursuance of the provisions of the Revised Statutes of the United States, Chapter Six, Title Thirty-two, and legislation, supplemental thereto, there have been deposited in the General Land Office of the United States the Plat and Field Notes of survey and the Certificate, No. 3236 dated the eighth day of December A. D. 1902 and the Certificate No. 3360 dated the twenty-second day of July A. D. 1903 of the Register of the Land Office at Salt Lake City in the State of Utah accompanied by other evidence whereby it appears that William L. Ellerbeck, James Clinton and Thomas R. Ellerbeck did on said dates the eighth day of December A. D. 1902 and the twenty-second day of July A.D. 1903, duly enter and pay for that certain Mining claim or premises, known as the Belle Spring No. 5, Belle Spring Claim No. 4, Belle Spring Mine No. 2, Belle Spring Claim No. 3, Belle Spring Mine No. 1 and Belle Spring No. 6 lode mining claims designated by the Surveyor-General as Lot No. 4847, embracing a portion of sections eight and nine, in township five south of range one west, Salt Lake Meridian, in the Lehi Mining District, in the County of Utah and State of Utah, in the District of Lands subject to sale at Salt Lake City and bounded, described, and platted as follows, with magnetic variation seventeen degrees east.

Thence, second course, south seventy-three degrees and thirty-nine minutes east one thousand three hundred and seventy-five and six tenths feet to corner No. 3.

Thence, fourth course, north seventy-three degrees and thirty-nine minutes west one thousand three hundred and seventy-five and six tenths feet to corner No. 1, the place of beginning; the survey of the lode claim as above described extending one thousand three hundred and seventy-five and six tenths feet in length along said Belle Spring No. 6 vein or lode.

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Now Know Ye, That there is therefore hereby Granted by the United States unto the said William L. Ellerbeck, James Clinton and Thomas R. Ellerbeck and to their heirs and assigns, the said mining premises hereinbefore described, and not expressly excepted from these presents, and all that portion of the said Belle Spring No. 5, Belle Spring Claim No. 4, Belle Spring Mine No. 2, Belle Spring Claim No. 3, Belle Spring Mine No. 1 and Belle Spring No. 6, veins or lodes, or ledges, and of all other veins, lodes, and ledges, throughout their entire depth, the tops or apexes of which lie inside of the surface boundary lines of said granted premises in said Lot No. 4847 extended downward vertically, although such veins, lodes, or ledges in their downward course, may so far depart from a perpendicular as to extend outside the vertical side lines of said premises:

Provided, That the right of possession to such outside parts of said veins, lodes, or ledges, shall be confined to such portions thereof as lie between vertical planes drawn downward through the end lines of said Lot No. 4847, so continued in their own direction that such planes will intersect such exterior parts of said veins, lodes or ledges: And provided further That nothing herein contained shall authorize the grantees herein to enter upon the surface of a claim owned or possessed by another.

To Have And To Hold said mining premises, together with all the rights privileges, immunities and appurtenances of whatsoever nature thereunto belonging unto the said grantees above named and to their heirs and assigns forever; subject nevertheless to the above mentioned and to the following conditions and stipulations:

First, That the premises hereby granted, with the exception of the surface, may be entered by the proprietor of any other vein, lode, or ledge, the top as apex of which lies outside of the boundary of said granted premises, should the same in its dip be found to penetrate, intersect, or extend into said premises, for the purpose of extracting and removing the ore from such other vein, lode, or ledge.

Second; That the premises hereby granted shall be held subject to any vested and accrued water rights for mining, agricultural, manufacturing, or other purposes, and rights to ditches and reservoirs used in connection with such water rights as may be recognized and acknowledged by the local laws, customs and decisions of the courts. And there is reserved from the lands hereby granted, a right of way thereon for ditches or canals constructed by the authority of the United States.

Third, that in the absence of necessary legislation by Congress, the Legislature of Utah may provide rules for working the mining claim or premises hereby granted involving easements, drainage, and other necessary means to its complete development.

In Testimony Whereof I Theodore Roosevelt, President of the United States of America, have caused these letters to be made Patent, and the Seal of the General Land Office to be hereunto affixed.
